Innu Tshissenitamun Innu Studies 2224 Course, 2023 UPDATED

Innu Tshissenitamun is an Innu Studies high school course created for the social studies program that celebrates the Innu culture and aims to instill a greater sense of Innu identity and pride.

The teachers guide outlines an approach and content that supports Innu students to learn about Innu culture in Innu ways, from Innu people in Innu contexts. It recommends the use of Innu resource people, authentic Innu resources, and Innu ways of teaching and learning.

Units: 1) Innu culture and identity; 2) *nutshimiu* immersion; 3) oral tradition and storytelling; 4) colonization and resistance; 5) governance and self-determination

In The Uepishtikueiau Story, Innu Elders tell the story of first contact.

The Visit tells a story about the Innu and Eeyou people coming together to celebrate a makushan, the Feast of the Caribou. The book is also about the mistreatment of the caribou and the people by the foreign culture, but how in the end the Innu people's respect and dreams triumph.



During their study of *Nitassinan Journey*, teachers and students will accompany the Pasteen and Pun families along two traditional Innu migration routes, and learn how the Innu culture—language, values, clothing, hunting, transportation, etc.—has been influenced by the land, seasons, animals, vegetation, and climate of their homeland, and by their contact with with the Inuit and European settlers.

Students learn about the concept of culture and the importance of storytelling in understanding Innu history.








3. Uapikun's Dream, 2006 Tea Doll takes Uapikun on a journey into the past where she learns how her people used to live.

7. Uapikun and Penguin, 2018



Rabies is a serious disease of animals that can also affect people.






8. Uapikun and the Tshiashinnuat, 2022 **NEW**

This enlightening book approaches the landscape of Labrador through the magic of Inuit storytelling and the science of geology. An Inuit legend explains the origin of a polar bear shape which can sometimes be seen in the black rocks above Nain when the light is just right.

This traditional Innu legend looks at the habits and habitats of animals found in the boreal forest of Labrador by telling the story of a man who is searching for the perfect wife. It brings together traditional and scientific knowledge to explain the way animals survive and provide for their needs, and shows the conflict that can result when the human and animal worlds collide.




NITASSINAN MAPS PROJECT

The Nitassinan Maps Project NEW

The Nitassinan puzzle, poster and floor maps were produced to help Innu students learn about their traditional territory, its place names, culture and history.

Background - The map draws on decades of land use mapping research conducted by the Innu Nation. Interviews to gather information for the maps were carried out by Jolene Ashini and Chelsee Arbour. Etienne and Janet Pone, Napess Ashini, Jodie Ashini, Angela and Etienne Andrew, as well as Aputet Andrew participated in interviews in Sheshatshiu, while Joachim and Mary Jane Nui, Akat Piwas, Damien Benuen and Sebastien Piwas were interviewed in Natuashish. Three open houses were held with over 20 people attending and sharing their knowledge.

People were asked to identify important place names. The idea was not to identify all place names, but rather significant places people thought Innu children should know about. A map was made of the place names collected. This first draft of the map was printed and circulated to people interviewed as well as others to confirm the names, their location and to add further names that had been missed. Spellings of the different places were checked against the Innu Nation place names map, so people would not confuse the names. Some place names were not part of the list of Innu Nation places and were checked for standardized spellings.





Listen and read along with books for children in Innu. Each word is highlighted as it is read.


- Play/Pause the recording




Nitinikiau Innusi: I Keep the Land Alive



Tshaukuesh belongs to the last generation of Innu to grow up in *nutshimit*. She became an environmental and cultural activist in the 1980s and 90s during the NATO occupation of Innu land.

Later, she led walks and canoe trips in *nutshimit* to teach people about Innu culture and knowlege of life on the land.

She began keeping a diary in Innu-aimun in the 1980s and has been writing ever since. This book is an edited translation of her diary, illustrated with numerous beautiful photos. It is a firsthand account of Innu history by an inspiring leader through tumultuous and challenging times.





Precious Little By Camille Fouillard Nimbus Publishing, 2022

One cold February morning in 1992, Anna receives a phone call, a request to work with the Utshimassiu Innu in Labrador to organize a people's inquiry, a self-exaination into a house fire that killed six children. Eager to escape a complicated relationsihp and afraid to face the grief of losing her father, Anna accepts the invitation. She catches a plane, painfully aware that she doesn't have a clue what a people's inquiry might look like, and heads for Nitassinan.

Inspired by true events, and the *Gathering Voices* report, of which Fouillard served as editor, *Precious Little* is a unique enmeshing of the imagination with memories and experiences spanning decades of working and living with the Innu. At its core, it is a journey toward unlearning and unknowing. By turns harrowing and empowering, provocative and enlightening, this novel is a powerful act of reconciliation and resistance in the face of trauma, infused with love, humility, humour and joy.



Nutshimit




When low-level flying by NATO jets upsets their way of life, Nanass, a young Innu girl, is eager to join her father and the other members of her Sheshatshiu community in protest. When her father and other protesters are arrested, Nanass has little to comfort her except her father's well-worn ball cap and the promise of the land itself that the Innu people will one day triumph.

Exactly What I Said Translating Words and Worlds By Elizabeth Yeoman University of Manitoba Press, 2022

"You don't have to use the exact same words.... But it has to mean exactly what I said." Thus began the ten-year collaboration between Innu elder and activist Tshaukuesh Elizabeth Penashue and Memorial University professor Elizabeth Yeoman that produced the celebrated *"Nitinikiau Innusi: I Keep the Land Alive"*.

Exactly What I Said: Translating Words and Worlds reflects on that collaboration and what Yeoman learned from it. It is about naming, mapping, and storytelling; about photographs, collaborative authorship, and voice; about walking together on the land and what can be learned along the way. Combining theory with personal narrative, Yeoman weaves together ideas, memories, and experiences—of home and place, of stories and songs, of looking and listening—to interrogate the challenges and ethics of translation.



Manikanetish

In Naomi Fontaine's Governor General's Literary Award finalist, a young teacher's return to her remote Innu community transforms the lives of her students, reminding us of the importance of hope in the face of despair.

After fifteen years of exile, Yammie, a young Innu woman, has come back to her home in Uashat, on Quebec's North Shore. She has returned to teach at the local school but finds a community stalked by despair. Yammie will do anything to help her students. When she accepts a position directing the end-of-year play, she sees an opportunity for the youth to take charge of themselves.

Kukum

Kukum tells the story of Almanda Siméon, an orphan raised by her aunt and uncle, who falls in love with a young Innu man and goes on to share her life with the Pekuakami Innu community. They accept her as one of their own: she learns their language and how to live in nutshimit. The story unfolds over a century as the reader learns about the traditional ways of the Innu, how Almanda's family faces the loss of their land, confinement to a reserve and the enduring violence of residential schools.



Naomi Fontaine writes a long letter to her friend Shuni, a young Quebecker who has come to her community to help the Innu. She evokes her history, the faces of her mother, father and grandmother appearing, and she speaks to Petit ours, her son. The landscapes of Uashat pass by, fragmented and radiant. She recounts the doubts that can lodge in colonized hearts, the impossible struggle to be oneself.

This fragile, tender letter speaks of the strength to invent the future, the light of truth. Life is a circle where everything begins again.

The Crooked Knife

A Nell Munro Mystery by Jan Morrison Boulder Books, 2022

Constable Nell Munro is angry and in danger of losing her job. A teacher, Jay Tuck, has been found dead, a crooked knife nearby. A two-spirit Innu youth named Pashin is the main suspect, but Nell doesn't buy it.

Local activists implore her to keep digging but when she does, Nell is threatened and worse – so are the kids she cares about. Even when the lead investigator threatens to put Nell on probation for her big mouth, she keeps going.



Who is responsible for the recent chaos on the reserve, and why do people who fight it end up either very quiet or very dead?

Mikuan and Shaniss, two girls growing up in a Quebec Innu community, have been inseperable since childhood. WORKS IN PROGRESS

Uapikun Series Book about a girl's adventure in Akami-Uapishk^u (Expected 2024)

Co-authored by Jodie Ashini and Hugh Whitney Mamu Tshishkutamashutau - Innu Education

A new book in the *Adventures of Uapikun* series is in progress about Akami-Uapishk^u National Park and its historical importance.

The book will be available in both Labrador dialects as printed books, readalongs, and still image videos.





Jean Pierre Ashini Book (Expected 2024-5) Co-publication of Mamu Tshishkutamashutau - Innu Education and Memorial University Press

A collection of stories, compiled by Jean Pierre Ashini–both *tipatshimuna* and *atanukana*–that he has heard first-hand from Innu *tshishennuat* (Elders) through his lifetime.

Timeline Project (Expected 2024)

- An *Innu Round Table* project with Natuashish and Sheshatshiu to produce a timeline that details important events in the history of the Innu people, providing the big picture of the Innu story including significant events from various eras: ancient, precontact, colonization, resistance, to the present day.
- To serve as a school resource and also to be shared with others who come to work in the communities.
- Plans are to produce a website, posters, and printed materials.



Manimat Antane utipatshimun: A Memoir By Manimat (Martha) Andrew (Expected 2024)

This book tells the story of Manimat's life as a first generation Innu to experience settlement in Sheshatshiu—the move from a nomadic self-reliant proud life on the land to the trauma of community life, including experiences with church and school. Her story is also about Innu fighting back, protesting against NATO military flight training, illegal hunting, schooling, mining, forestry and hydro developments. Her book will educate Innu children about their history and give them hope to continue to resist and fight for their rights.

WORKS IN PROGRESS



Tshina Christine Poker feature film (Expected 2025)

This film tells the story of a young Mushuau Innu girl, as she experiences the settlement of her people in the 1970s from a nomadic way of life to the village of Davis Inlet. It will dramatize how the church, school, police and other institutions changed her life—their impact on her family and community, and how she navigated these changes from an innocent childhood, to a reckless adolescence and finally to the challenges of adulthood. This girl will grow into a woman struggling for her life, but she will find healing and her way to make things right and support her community.

Innu-aimun 2015 Course - Guide and Workbook (Expected 2024)

A revised Innu-aimun 2015 course with teacher's guide and accompanying student workbook for this accredited high school course. Also a guide with lesson plans for Innu Speakers/Classroom Assistants to teach the course.



Wolverine Creates the World Told by Annie Picard A co-publication between Mamu Tshishkutamashutau - Innu Education and Running the Goat Books and Broadsides (Expected 2024)

An Innu *atanukan*, as told to Annie by her grandmother. A long time ago after the great flood, the surviving animals were stranded in a big canoe. Kuekuatsheu looked for an animal to fetch some earth at the bottom of the waters, so that he could create land. Several animals attempt the plunge but fail to reach the bottom. The humblest of animals, Missinak^u, is the one in the end to save the day.

Caribou People Innu Nation and Mamu Tshishkutamashutau - Innu Education joint project (Expected 2025)

A book, and possibly other formats, to document the importance of the caribou to the Innu. These include the many uses in daily life as well as how ancient bonds that tie the Innu to the caribou, like hunting respectfully and following sacred rituals such as the shaking tent and the *makushan*, are affirmed and keep the Innu culture strong. The book will include Innu *tshissenitamun* about the caribou, as well as Innu *atanukana*, and information on the decline of the herds and how Innu are working to bring the caribou back to keep their culture alive.

This catalogue lists resources available for teaching and learning about Innu culture and language at the primary, elementary and high school levels. Many resources will be of interest to anyone wanting to know more about the Innu.

This 2023 edition includes more than 150 new and updated resources.
